Keynote speakers



Franck Portier

He is a Professor of Economics at University College London and a Professor of Economics at Toulouse School of Economics (on unpaid leave). He is also a senior member of the Institut Universitaire de France (IUF), a research fellow at CEPR, a former Editor of *Annals of Economics and Statistics*, and a former Deputy-President of the University Toulouse I.

His research concentrates on macroeconomics, with a special focus on the analysis of business cycle fluctuations. In particular, he developed, together with Paul Beaudry, the “news theory” of the business cycle - the notion that a significant fraction of observed economic fluctuations could be explained by expected (not current) changes in economic fundamentals. His works have been published in leading economic journals such as the *American Economic Review*, the *Review of Economics Studies*, the *Journal of Economic Literature*, the *Journal of Monetary Economics*, the *Journal of Economic Theory*, and *NBER Macroeconomic Annuals*.



Michèle Tertilt

She is a Professor of Economics at the University of Mannheim, and a former Assistant Professor at Stanford University. She is currently an editorial board member of the *Review of Economic Studies*. Furthermore, she is an Associate Editor of the *Journal of Development Economics*. She is also a Research Affiliate at BREAD and the European Development Research Network (EUDN) and a Research Fellow at CEPR and CESifo. In September 2013 she was awarded the Gossenpreis - an annual award by the Verein für Socialpolitik which recognizes the best published economist under 45 working in the German speaking area. She is the first woman to win this prestigious prize. In 2017, she was elected as a Fellow of the Econometrics Society and awarded the Yrjö Jahnsson Award - a biennial award by the European Economic Association and the Yrjö Jahnsson Foundation, given to a European economist no older than 45 years old who has made a contribution in theoretical and applied research that is significant to economics in Europe.

Her research concentrates on macroeconomics, economic development and intra-family interactions. She has also worked on consumer credit and bankruptcies. She has published in all leading economics journal, such as: *American Economic Review*, *Econometrica*, the *Journal of Political Economy*, the *Quarterly Journal of Economics*, the *Review of Economics Studies*, and many others.



Romain Wacziarg

He is a Professor of Economics at UCLA Anderson School of Management where he holds the Hans Hufschmid Chair in Management. He obtained his PhD at Harvard University and he is a former Associate Professor at Stanford University. He is also a Research Associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER), an associate Editor of the *Journal of Economic Growth* and of the *World Bank Economic Review*, and a former member of the board of Editors of the *American Economic Review*.

Romain Wacziarg’s research aims to understand what explains economic performance, tackling this issue at several levels. For instance, he analyses factors such as globalization, the spread of democracy, the historical legacy of geography, ethnic divisions and other cultural traits, etc., as potential causes of a country’s economic performance. His works have been published in prestigious economics journals such as *American Economic Review*, the *Quarterly Journal of Economics*, the *Journal of Economic Literature*, the *Review of Economics and Statistics*, the *Journal of Economic Growth*, and many others.
